- 1. Start by making sure your pet is wearing a collar and tag with current information and that they have an up-to-date microchip ID. If your pet needs a microchip, consider visiting one of our upcoming vaccine clinics.
- 2. Know where to look. Locate your local animal shelter where your pet might be taken should they be picked up by animal control or a good Samaritan. Visit or call the shelter to learn more about the pets they currently have in their lost and found areas and to file a missing pet report. Also, check your neighborhood Nextdoor and Facebook groups. You can also post a description and photo of your lost pet in these groups and encourage family and friends to share the post.
- 3. Licensing your pet is a great way to help them reconnect with you should they go missing. Pets licensed in Jefferson County have a higher chance of quickly being reunited with their owners, and proceeds from pet licensing help support the being done at Foothills Animal Shelter.
